Speech pathologists in some States are subject to Statutory Codes of Conduct based on a model National Code of Conduct. This is effectively a set of minimum standards, and a safety net designed to protect the public from unsafe and predatory practices. Know Key legal obligations under the Codes of Conduct.	Speech pathologists: Must: Provide safe and ethical health care Obtain consent for treatment Take care to protect clients from infection Minimise harm and act appropriately if something goes wrong Report concerns about other practitioners Keep appropriate records and comply with privacy laws Be covered by insurance Display information about the general code of conduct and making a complaint Must not: Mislead clients about their products, services or qualifications Put clients at risk due to their own physical or mental health problems Practice under the influence of drugs or alcohol Make false claims about curing serious illnesses such as cancer Exploit clients financially
	 Have an inappropriate relationship with clients Discourage clients from seeking other health care or refuse to cooperate with other practitioners if they do. In NSW (but not in other jurisdictions), speech pathologists also need a clinical basis for treatment.
If speech pathologists breach the relevant Code of Conduct, clients can lodge complaints with authorities.
